Composer of the month

As a further step in raising music's profile in the Grange Primary School and promoting musical literacy among our pupils, we are going to introduce for KS2 a composer of the month.

In the National Curriculum it is stated: "ensure that all pupils can perform, listen to, review and evaluate music across a range of historical periods, genres, styles and traditions, including the works of the great composers and musicians".

To achieve this goal, we will be using **BBC Ten pieces.** (https://www.bbc.co.uk/teach/ten-pieces/all-resources/zdg3t39). This is a wonderfully rich resource allowing to go as deep into the subject as the Teacher likes. There are several videos: one is usually with the commentary about the composer and his music (we would recommend to watch it first) the others are the performance by an orchestra of the whole piece or of certain parts of the piece of music. The commentaries in the first piece use a lot of musical vocabulary and demonstrates how to talk about the impressions/feelings created by the music.

Most of them also have Powerpoint presentations which are designed to last for 6 weeks. We suggest the Teachers pick out just a few elements that are most suitable for their class (for example, there are some simple but exciting patterns to clap or sing).

Ultimately, this should be an enjoyable and enriching activity when children expand their musical horizons and learn to appreciate and appraise music from different historic periods and various nations. Please, remember to be creative and flexible because it will be hard to stay still while listening to some of the pieces ©
